WCMSC COLLABORATIVE RE-SEARCH PROJECTS SELECTED FOR FOUNDATION OF CMSC SUPPORT

From its founding in 1986 the mission of the CMSC has focused on supporting research contributing to enhanced clinical care and outcomes. This mission has evolved into one of the "pillars" of the Foundation of the CMSC

Under the direction of Dr. Robert Lisak. the CMSC Research Committee invites requests for proposals annually. This year, a total of four pilot projects were funded.Two of the four selected studies were supported by the FCMSC. The Steven R. Schwid Memorial Study Grant Award, supported by a grant through the FCMSC by Teva Neuroscience, was presented to Susan Bennett, PT, EdD, NCS. MSCS. Clinical Associate Professor. Departments of Rehabilitation Science and Neurology at the University of Buffalo, for her group's submission, "Validity, Reliability and Sensitivity of Three Gait Measures for MS."

Dr. Bennett explained that her study follows previous research conducted by Dr Schwid and his colleagues in examining gait measures and motor performance of individuals with MS. Dr. Bennett commented. "Dr Schwid was an outstanding neurologist who was loved by his patients and those of us in rehabilitation.



The memorial awards established by the Foundation of the CMSC recognize the late Steven R. Schwid, MD, professor of Neurology at the University of Rochester Medical Center, who passed away in November of 2008. Dr. Schwid was an Associate Chair for Clinical Research in the Department of Neurology, Co-Director of the Rochester Multiple Sclerosis Center and Associate Director of the Clinical Trials Coordination Center. He was an expert in identifying and treating symptoms such as depression, fatigue, and cognitive impairment in MS and other central nervous system disorders. Dr. Schwid was a key figure in the organizing committee of the CMSC Cooperative Studies effort, which in 2009 funded four important research studies that promise to improve our understanding of the outcomes of MS comprehensive care.

and I am deeply honored to receive the Steven Schwid Memorial Study Award. We will all miss his presence, engaging personality and all that he challenged in his patients and colleagues."

Additionally, the FCMSC collaborated with CMSC in funding a second study grant, "Exploring the Potential of Nintendo Wii to Promote Exercise in Persons with MS," submitted by Marcia Finlayson, PhD, OT(C), OTR/L, from the University of Illinois, Chicago. This innovative project uses 21st century technology to assess patient outcomes of self-directed activity and exercise in people with multiple sclerosis. It will build upon previous evidence that supports the benefit of this strategy in older adults.

A grant from Acorda Therapeutics, Inc. has generously provided support through the Foundation for the first of three consecutive annual Steven R. Schwid Memorial Summer Research Scholar*ships* in 2009. This year's recipient, David Jeffrey Sackel, is enrolled at the University of Pennsylvania School of Medicine. David's summer research project titled, "Contribution of Visual Symptoms to Overall Health-Related Quality of Life (HRQOL) and Economic Status in Multiple Sclerosis" will be conducted under the mentorship of Laura Balcer, MD, MSCE.

The Foundation of the CMSC remains dedicated to collaborative study projects enhancing evidence based clinical care. Work will begin immediately on these study projects, with results scheduled for presentation at the 2010 CMSC annual meeting in San Antonio, Texas

The Labe C. Scheinberg Award Contributes to Building a Comprehensive Care Model for MS



Each year, the FCMSC presents the Labe C. Scheinberg Award for outstanding work in the field of neurorehabilitation to individuals working on projects that best represent the multidisciplinary team spirit championed by Dr Scheinberg and prevalent among MS professionals.

Labe C. Scheinberg, MD, was a CMSC founder and a proponent of comprehensive care in multiple sclerosis, as well as a founder of the American Society of Neurorehabilitation and a national and international thought leader. Many noted neurologists, nurses, scientists, psychologists, and rehabilitation specialists owe a debt of gratitude to Dr. Scheinberg, whose vision lives on today in many MS Centers and professional practices.

Dr Scheinberg was one of the first clinicians to recognize and treat complex and subtle symptoms such as fatique, depression, and cognitive loss. He was generous with his advice to and support of fellows and students and his MS center, at the Albert Einstein College of Medicine, provided the model for many contemporary MS Centers. The Scheinberg Award was initiated by the CMSC during Dr. Scheinberg's lifetime, and continues to benefit deserving clinical research through the annual generous support of members of the Scheinberg family.
